

## MAKING AN ENTRANCE

Designer **Tere Bresin** of **Beret Design Group** in Upper Montclair shares her thoughts on the power of a well-designed entry.

When you walk into a home, you want your eye to stop in the foyer and notice how special it is. Give attention to light sources: sconces, chandeliers, and accent lighting. Color is also tied into great lighting that can stop the eye —

Bresin, whose firm is Beret Design Group and who is a professional member of the American Society of Interior Designers, transformed the humdrum foyer into a cozy entry. To lighten the space, she replaced a dark, mixed-color slate floor with Claire limestone. She also added red glaze to the walls to create a sense of warmth. New low-voltage down lights coupled with an existing chandelier lighten the space and accent the new gold-tone Oriental rug.
